The Passage

I Samuel 18:1-5, 20:1-42

Questions

Who is your best friend? Tell us about them.

Why do you think Jonathan was so drawn to David?

How can our friendships begin to look more like that of Jonathan and David?

Prayer

God... Thank you for Your sacrifice. You walked to the cross to save us as the greatest friend anyone could ever have. Show us how we can care for the people in our lives as You care for us. We want Your fingerprints all over our friendships. Help us to be a family that consistently serves those around us.



The Story

David is the talk of the nation. Young, handsome, dashing, victorious in battle, talented.... everything anyone could want in a leader. He could do no wrong in the eyes of the people. But more importantly, the hand of God is visible on his life. King Saul, feeling David's popularity threatening his own prestige, held a growing resentment toward the young man, even as David served Saul daily in the palace. You can almost sense just how awkward that room must have felt! But from this tension, an unlikely friendship emerged. Jonathan, the prince of Israel and Saul's eldest son, felt himself drawn to David and they became close friends. But what makes this story all the more amazing is that David was actually taking Jonathan's throne. As the eldest son, he would have been the next king of Israel. But God had chosen David, leaving Jonathan out of the picture. Yet time and again throughout this story, we see Jonathan protecting and caring for David, even as his father tried to kill the young man. This relationship is a picture of true friendship. This passage shows two people who genuinely care for one another, no matter what the situation. But Jesus has been an even greater friend, a friend who gave His all so that we could be saved. A friend who cast aside His own life for our survival. Are you and I that type of friend? Do we genuinely care about those around us, placing their needs and goals ahead of our own? This is the standard we get of true friendship from 1 Samuel 20. How can we follow their lead in our own lives?
